Session Descriptions

Can Scripture Stories Be Funny?

Come explore how humor may serve to both challenge our faith and enhance faith practice. Some humor is subtle, can it also be precarious? Even in the midst of danger possibly inherent in humor, in the end, it seeks to deepen faith should we allow it.

Over the three sessions, Father Tony will explore key stories that he believes are intended to be humorous. Together we will find the laughter (and danger?) in the stories of Balaam and his donkey, Abraham and Sarah and some of the encounters between Jesus and his "would be" disciples.

The Day of the Donkey: A Prophet, a King, and a Donkey go into a bar..."

How do we know something is funny? Can humor ever be "innocent"? (*Numbers 22-24*)

SESSION TWO // JUNE 16

Surprise? Surprise! Abraham and Sarah Improvising when "Mazel-Moments" come our way. (Gen 18)

SESSION THREE // JUNE 30

Is That a Parable or a Very Subtle Joke? Humor as test and an invitation to faith and joy. (*Various passage in the Gospels*)
